Scotland's Climate Assembly Seanadh Gnàth-shìde na h-Alba

So, what is this investigation about?

In Scotland, 100 people have been chosen to be part of something called a 'Citizens' Assembly' to discuss how to tackle climate change in Scotland.

The Assembly will tell their plans to Scottish Parliament in March 2021. To be a member of the Assembly, you must be over 16 years old.

So, to make sure children are included, the Assembly has invited Children's Parliament to help them listen to and understand your views on how we can tackle climate change in Scotland.

That's where you come in!

We will work with 100 children across Scotland aged 8 - 14 to make sure your views and ideas are involved in the Climate Assembly.

Because of coronavirus, this project will be online and take place during school time. An adult from your school will help you to complete the activities.

You and the other 99 children will complete three digital surveys in October, December and February.

There will be a creative part too such as creating and uploading a piece or art or short audio/film clip.

As an Investigator, you will:

Work with 11 other children from across Scotland to explore the findings from the survey.

Learn about the climate change evidence that the adult Assembly members will be learning about.



Meet the other Investigators twice a month on an online video call with the Children's Parliament team.

Create some short films to share with us and a filmmaker who'll create a film based using all the footage. These films will be shown to the Assembly members when they meet each month.


